It was intended to help the three subsidized communities recover from the behavioral health effects of the Great Recession, as well as arming these cities and their citizens with the tools to better deal with any subsequent economic downturns. Due to the shortened time frame of the initiative and significant challenges with the community data for each grantor, our evaluation is not conclusive with regard to the impact of these grants on the wider communities. However, the findings suggest that many of the individuals who received services through the initiatives reported better outcomes in both employment and self-reported behavioural complaints. In addition, the subsidies had a positive impact on the infrastructure for the provision of services in each of these communities. For example, the many requirements of the CRRRI grant for partnerships, screening, and collaborations with new entities led individuals and organizations to examine their entire community in much more detail. In gaining an understanding of the link between economic distress and behavioral health challenges, new links have been formed between behavioral caregivers and employment services in each community. Probably these cross-references will continue to go forward. Another important aspect of this effort was the project's emphasis on the need to continually outreach and share mental health and resources of the dust program with the broader community. Through the efforts of the grants and research, there is increased awareness among many residents about how depression, substance use, and unemployment are linked in times of poor economic conditions. In addition, staff at all three sites felt that their efforts had supported the stigma surrounding help-seeking mental health services and reaching people who normally do not have access to behavioral health. However, since outreach and screening are not refundable services for providers, communities will need to identify financial resources that allow them to participate in these activities. Offering grant opportunities similar to CRRRI to other communities would allow them to learn the same about how screening, coaching to seek help, reduce stigma and coordinate service systems to lead to more collaboration experience better access to the customer's services and results. The CRRRI grants also provided funds that enabled financially strapped organizations to hire needed staff. In Lorain, for example, several public health nurses were able to return to service after a layoff and provided critical outreach services inhabitants of the city. In Union City, staff adjusted all outreach and treatment resources for members of the Hispanic community and hired bilingual staff to meet the specific needs and values of this community. Service providers are generally aware of the gaps in services in their communities, but do not always have the resources to meet the needs of their residents. The CRRRI projects enabled three communities to take positive steps towards addressing their diverse gaps in the range and delivery of services. Grant-funded projects must always strike a balance between requiring all grants to carry out the same activities and enabling grant-givers to adapt their approaches to the unique needs of their communities. Although the variations from an evaluation point of view are problematic, the flexibility of the CRRRI grants has led to a number of important innovations. In Union City, for example, the grantee recognized the central place of youth within the ethos of the inhabitants of that city. Instead of focusing on serving adults directly, they developed a high school substance use program that also acted as a tool to recruit more community families into mental health and other services. Lorain's project director believed that the African-American residents of that community had not only been negatively affected by the Great Recession, but also had long-term unemployment problems that had not been adequately addressed by the service delivery system. It therefore paid particular attention to this part of the population of the city, despite the fact that the employment-related issues of this population were more chronic than emerging. Finally, Fall River has adopted a case management model to offer short interventions to registered customers. Although case management is a much more intensive service delivery model than was adopted by the other two companies, these 6-month relationships were linked to positive customer results and contributed to the collection of a fairly complete set of data for analysis. The CRRRI grants enabled innovative treatment approaches, new community partnerships and awareness of a critical link between economic distress and behavioural problems in service providers. It is to be hoped that these achievements will contribute to the resilience of these three communities as they face widespread economic challenges in the future.
